ALTERNATIVE FUELED VEHICLES DISPLAYED AT EAW ON APRIL 23 & 24: Come and check out the alternative fueled vehicles during the **Environmental & Energy Awareness Week**. The vehicles will be displayed from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on the 23rd of April in front of the Headquarters Building and on the 24th at the VAB Area (Parking Lot E). View a 1998 bi-fuel Contour, a 2000 dedicated CNG Honda Civic, and a 2001 E85 Caravan. The bi-fuel Contour is equipped with two separate fuel tanks. One tank runs on compressed natural gas (CNG) and the other runs on unleaded gas. A gaseous fuel indicator (GFI) switch is located on the dash so that the user can select to run the vehicle on CNG or unleaded. If the driver is operating the vehicle on CNG fuel and all the fuel is used, the vehicle will automatically switch over to the unleaded tank. The dedicated CNG Honda Civic runs solely on compressed natural gas, and is listed as a near-zero emission vehicle. It can be driven 200-250 miles on a full tank of fuel. The E-85 Caravan has the capability of running on ethanol and/or unleaded fuel. KSC does not offer ethanol fuel at this time. STORMWATER RUNOFF AND THE POLLUTION IT CAUSES IN OUR WATERWAYS: Danielle Stern, from the Brevard County Regional Stormwater Utility Department, will be speaking during **Environmental & Energy Awareness Week** on Stormwater Runoff and the Pollution It Causes In Our Waterways. Water that drains from land surfaces during or immediately following a rainstorm is called stormwater runoff. Untreated stormwater runoff is now considered the state's leading source of water pollution. The first inch of stormwater runoff is the most polluted because it picks up 90% of the trash, dirt, leaves, chemicals, oils, bacteria, ground up metals and rubber, fertilizers and pesticides from our streets, our homes, our yards, industrial activities and construction sites. Her presentation will provide you with tips that you can follow to help reduce pollution caused by stormwater runoff plus let you know what their department is doing to combat the problem. DID YOU EVER WONDER WHO ARE THOSE PEOPLE IN THE PONTOON BOATS AT KSC AND WHAT DO THEY DO? Did you ever drive across the Banana River and see people in wetsuits crawling around in the water or wonder what are those people in the pontoon boats doing? Well, here is your chance to find out! Since the early 1980's, the Aquatics Program under the LSSC Program has been responsible for long-term monitoring and research programs related to the water resources surrounding KSC. Several aspects of this program will be discussed at the **Environmental & Energy Awareness Week** including information on the long-term seagrass monitoring, manatee aerial surveys, sea turtle nesting, responses to animal strandings and water quality issues. WHAT IS A GEOPROBE AND HOW DOES IT WORK? The geoprobe uses a "direct push" method into the ground without the use of drilling to make a path for the tool. The geoprobe relies on static (vehicle) weight and percussion as the energy for advancement into the earth. It has the ability to collect a soil sample at a depth of about 50 feet for analyses. With tubing it can also obtain groundwater starting at the soil/water interface to any depth down to approximately 50 feet for sampling and analysis. Basically, the plume of contamination can be determined vertically and horizontally without installing monitoring wells. SPILL RESPONSE FOR HYDROCARBONS: What is Flame Ionization Detection? A flame ionization detector (FID) measures organic compounds by utilizing a flame produced by the combustion of hydrogen and air. When hydrocarbons in the sample are introduced to the detection zone, ions are produced. This current is then amplified and sent to an analog readout device. The majority of spills at the Space Center are hydrocarbon-based fuels. By using the FID, we can determine how much contaminated soil must be removed without waiting for laboratory analyses. Immediate on-site readings are obtained, which is approved by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection. INDOOR AIR QUALITY AT WORK AND AT HOME: In today's world, we spend increasing amounts of time in indoor environments and greater concerns about reducing energy costs. These factors may very well result in the potential for individuals to experience adverse health affects caused by sensitivity to any number of allergens. Up to 40% of the U.S. population may experience allergy like symptoms when exposed to biological sources such as molds, pollens, dust mites, and insect parts, and others. The typical way that energy costs are reduced in facilities is to control use of the facility Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) system by turning the systems off when the facility is not occupied. In a hot and humid climate like Florida turning off HVAC systems allows for permeation of the building with humid air from outside. When the system is turned back on, the temperature is lowered and humidity in the air can condensate out onto surfaces and assist in mold growth within the facility. Increased use of cloth and/or synthetic materials in facilities such as carpeting, chairs, cubicle panels, and wall coverings almost assures that the population of dust mites will increase. Dust mites are found everywhere humans are present. These tiny creatures emit very small amounts of volatile organic hydrocarbons (VOC) during normal biological functions. Through time, some individuals will experience increased sensitivity to these VOCs and will start to exhibit allergy like symptoms. Once an individual becomes sensitive to allergens, every time they are exposed, their sensitivities will tend to increase. KSC has a large number of facilities that are greater than 30 years old and the HVAC systems in these facilities are well past their normal life span in a hot and humid climate like Florida. The SGS HVAC Shop works very hard trying to assure these systems are maintained at the highest efficiency possible. It is not known how many people in the U.S. miss work due to illness related to allergies, but, it is likely that lost work time annually is in the millions of man-hours. This results in loss of productivity and efficiency for the affected organization and increased medical cost for the individual and organization. Many of the problems found in the work place are also in the home and personnel can acquire sensitivity to one or more biological allergens. The KSC Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) Working Group is actively working on programs to improve air quality in the work place and familiarization of personnel to the types of problems that need to be looked out for and/or prevented. The IAQ Working Group will have a booth during **Environmental & Energy Awareness Week**, April 23-24, intended on making employees at KSC aware of things they can do to improve air quality both in their work place and their own homes. MIDDENS, MOUNDS, CANALS AND CASTLES—A LOOK AT KSC BEFORE THE SPACE AGE: The first people to occupy the KSC area arrived several thousands of years ago. Evidence of their occupation takes many forms, from light scatterings of artifacts found on the ground surface to burial mounds and shell middens marking the locations of the dead and the living. After the last aboriginal populations vanished from the area, early American settlers made their homes where the Indians once lived. Hidden in remote places not far from where man was launched into space, archaeologists have uncovered the sites of homesteads and commercial enterprises, as well as the remains of an old fort and canal. Joan Deming, co-principal and Vice President of Archaeological Consultants, Inc. in Sarasota, Florida will focus on the results of a multi-year archaeological survey of the KSC. After the presentation, join Joan for a hands-on look at some of the "stones and bones" discovered during her investigations. ENVIRONMENTAL & ENERGY AWARENESS WEEK: Mr. David B. Struhs, Secretary of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, will be at KSC on April 22 in the Training Auditorium in celebration of **Earth Day**. The **Environmental & Energy Awareness Week** celebration will begin with an Opening/Awards Ceremony in the Training Auditorium on April 22 at 10 a.m. Mr. Struhs will discuss the Governor's Energy Budget Priorities. He was appointed Secretary by Governor Jeb Bush in January 1999 and confirmed by the Florida Senate in March. Mr. Struhs oversees Florida's environmental regulatory and law enforcement programs, the acquisitions and management of public lands, including an extensive system of state parks, and the development and regulation of Florida's water resources through the state's water management districts. Upon his arrival in Florida, Secretary Struhs became chief strategist and advocate for the passage of Governor Jeb Bush's "Florida Forever" Plan—the largest conservation land program in the world. In his first year in Florida, the Florida Junior Chamber of Commerce named Mr. Struhs "**Outstanding Young Environmentalist**." Secretary Struhs takes pride and finds personal pleasure in the 150 parks operated by DEP. Florida's State Parks currently hold the National Park and Recreation Association's Gold Medal, having been voted the best state parks system in America. He has also gained national recognition for Florida's DEP by successfully arguing that the "reasonable assurance" test widely used by environmental regulators as the standard for issuing permits should consider the applicant's record of environmental performance. 

Although emphasis is placed on major procurement fraud, (particularly allegations of defective/substandard parts, mischarging, kickbacks, bid rigging, and research fraud), investigations are also conducted of theft, conflict of interest, environmental and hazardous waste violations, health care fraud, and computer related crimes. OCI also provides fraud briefings for Government and contractor employees that are designed to highlight potential risks concerning fraud and related matters. 
