NUTRITION TIP OF THE WEEK FROM THE KSC FITNESS CENTERS: How Can I Prevent Cholesterol Problems? People who have a genetic predisposition to cholesterol problems should follow their doctor's dietary recommendations. The rest of us should be able to keep cholesterol levels in check by not consuming more than 30% of our daily calories from fat.

- 1. Cut back on red meat because of its high saturated fat and cholesterol content.
2. Eat poultry sparingly and remove the skin; chicken has less saturated fat than red meat but still contains significant cholesterol.
3. Increase your consumption of seafood. Most fish contains less fat and cholesterol than red meat.
4. Whenever possible, go easy on whole dairy products, mayonnaise, chocolate, tropical oils, and hydrogenated or partially hydrogenated oils or fats such as margarine.
5. For cooking, replace saturated fats that are solid at room temperature (such as butter and shortening) with liquid monounsaturated fats such as olive, canola or flax oil. There is evidence that consuming moderate amounts of monounsaturated fat — found in such foods as nuts, seeds, and avocados — may actually lower LDL cholesterol.
6. Eating red grapes may help reduce blood cholesterol, thanks to flavonoid compounds in their skins.
7. Limit yourself to three eggs a week: One egg yolk contains almost an entire day's allowance of cholesterol.
8. Vitamins, minerals, and nutrients that have reputed cholesterol-reducing properties include vitamins E, C, and A (beta-carotene), calcium and zinc. Try incorporating foods that naturally contain these nutrients, such as rice, bran, artichokes, shiitake mushrooms, and chili peppers.
9. Finally, select foods that contain water-soluble fiber, which offers an excellent defense against high blood cholesterol. High-fiber foods include grapefruit, apples, beans and other legumes, psyllium seed, barley, carrots, cabbage, and oatmeal.

USE OF MULTICOLOR OFFSET PRINTING, COLOR COPIERS, AND COLOR PRINTERS: Managers and employees are reminded that all color printing/copying must be in accordance with NPG 1490.5A. The NPG states that offset printing in two or more colors is prohibited for work in which additional colors provide no demonstrable value, but are used primarily for decorative effect. The unnecessary use of color products costs the government additional money without additional benefit. The NASA Inspector General has reviewed various agency products and determined that color products have increased significantly. Managers at all centers are to ensure requests for multicolor printing and color copying are only made when the use of multiple colors adds demonstrable value, not just cosmetic appeal, to the product. UNAUTHORIZED COMMITMENTS AND RATIFICATIONS: An unauthorized commitment is an agreement between the Government and a contractor that is not binding; solely, because the Government representative who made it lacked the authority to enter into that **UNAUTHORIZED** agreement on behalf of the Government. Ratification is the act of approving an unauthorized commitment by an official who has the authority to do so. Unauthorized commitments are strongly discouraged and can indicate serious employee misconduct. Individuals making unauthorized commitments may be subject to disciplinary action, and the issue may be referred to the Office of the Inspector General. Only Contracting Officers acting within the limits of their delegated authority are authorized to commit the Government. If you are unsure of your authority, before directing a contractor to take any action, call your project control office, or the Procurement Office at 867-7217, for assistance. (OP-AM)

OFFICIAL NASA/KSC U.S. MAIL: When sending official NASA/KSC U.S. Mail using NASA envelopes or mailing labels, the return address must contain the mailcode of the sender. Mail couriers will reject mail which does not contain a return address. (TA-E1)

PRINTING/COPYING PAPER USERS: The NASA HQ Code JT has set a goal for each center to reduce the annual use of paper stocks by 10 percent. Suggestions on how to accomplish this goal are printing on both sides of the paper; circulating, posting, and publishing memoranda and other information using email, bulletin boards, routing slips, newsletters; and distributing documents in electronic format via file servers or home pages to avoid making copies on office copiers. Your support in implementing these suggestions will help meet KSC's paper reduction goal. (TA-B3)

ORDERING BLANK FORMS/PUBLICATIONS: All requests for blank forms and publications should be submitted on KSC Form 7-11 to the Forms Warehouse (mailcode: "FORMS WAREHOUSE"). Allow approximately 5 working days to receive the requested material. Any requests for emergency or work-stoppage forms will be handled by Forms Control by calling 867-3590. Customers should not go directly to the warehouse to pick up forms without calling Forms Control first. Customers cannot call the Forms Warehouse direct because they have an unlisted telephone number. (TA-E1)

PRIVACY ACT NOTICE: When Privacy Act Information (Social Security Numbers, etc.) is created, place NASA Form 1534, "THE ATTACHED MATERIAL IS SUBJECT TO THE PRIVACY ACT OF 1974, AS AMENDED," over the information. If Privacy Act information is to be sent to another individual or office, a "TO BE OPENED BY ADDRESSEE ONLY" envelope, KSC Form, 13-242 (as revised), must be used. (TA-E1)

KSC LOCATOR: Personnel at KSC are reminded, when submitting KSC Form 13-58 (Employee Locator Information) to KSC-Locator, to verify all information including the telephone directory information block. Monthly updates to the Locator printouts should be complete. This includes the "Telephone Directory" column. The letter "T" in this column indicates that the name appears in the telephone directory. Home phone numbers will not be printed in the telephone directory unless a signed Form 13-58 is submitted. (TA-E1)

NPG 7120.5A PR CERTIFICATION: Effective March 26, 1999, NASA policy requires all Procurement Requests (PR's) to be accompanied by a certification stating either that the purchase request action "is" or "is not" in support of the programs and projects subject to the requirements of NASA Procedures and Guidelines (NPG) 7120.5A, NASA Program and Project Management Processes and Requirement. If the action is in support of a program or project that is subject to the NPG, the certification must then indicate whether: a) all NPG 7120.5A documentation is current and approved, or b) authority to release the solicitation without the required documentation has been granted. An acceptable certification format is located immediately under the internal KSC OP Procurement Home Page header at: <http://www-op.ksc.nasa.gov/procurement/op.htm>. PR's not accompanied by the required certification will not be processed in the Procurement Office until such certification is received. (OP-AM)

VOLUNTARY LEAVE TRANSFER PROGRAM: The leave transfer program is one of the most popular benefits. To qualify for this program, an employee must establish the existence of a medical emergency (for self or family members) which is expected to result in a requirement for at least 3 days of leave without pay, after the use of existing annual and/or sick leave (earned, not advanced). Leave transfer requests must include documentation from a physician on the medical condition and an estimate of the employee's projected length of absence. If an employee wishes his/her participation in the program announced in the KSC Bulletin, or within his/her organization, he/she may include such a statement in the letter of request. Affected employees would normally initiate requests for a declaration of a medical emergency through supervisory channels; however, if they are unable to do so, their supervisor, family members, or co-workers may initiate the request. Employees wishing to donate leave may do so, subject to certain restrictions. Only earned annual (or restored) leave may be donated, and total donations of leave may not exceed one half of that which would be earned in the remainder of the current leave year. Employees wishing to donate leave are strongly encouraged to donate at least 8 hours at a time, since the effort involved in processing leave transfers is significant. Leave donor forms are available in the BA-B Office and in most Administrative Offices. Donations of leave should be sent directly to BA-B, Room 2507, Headquarters Building. Requests for leave transfer are treated as confidential, unless the employee states otherwise. The names of donors are anonymous and will not be released except as needed to process the donation.
