TAKE A SPIN ON THE SEGWAY HUMAN TRANSPORTER DURING EEAW: Come to the **Environmental Policy Booth** during Environmental and Energy Awareness Week, April 22 & 23, and sign up to drive a Segway (HT). What is it you say? It is the first self-balancing, electric-powered transportation device. The device is narrower than a standard doorway and is clean and quiet. There are zero emissions. With dimensions no larger than the average adult body and the ability to emulate human balance, the Segway HT uses the same space as a pedestrian, and can go wherever a person can walk. The Segway HT will allow people at home and at work to go farther, move more quickly, and increase the amount they can carry anywhere they currently walk. For commercial settings, it is ideally suited for large scale manufacturing plants and warehousing operations, travel and tourism, public safety, corporate and campus transportation, as well as mail, package and product delivery. SIGN UP FOR THE LC-34 TOUR DURING EEAW: April 22 only. Come see the "proving ground" for new and innovative methods for cleaning up contaminated groundwater. During the Apollo Program, there was little if any guidance for the disposal of spent solvents. Regulatory agencies like the U.S. EPA didn't even exist until December of 1970, and edicts outlining appropriate disposal practices were even later in coming. Hence the evolution of the groundwater problem at the Apollo Launch Pads. Launch Complex 34 (LC34) was the site of the Apollo 1 accident and the Apollo 7 launch. The Engineering Support Building at LC34 was used to clean many of the engine and rocket parts associated with the Program, and the spent solvents used during this cold-war era were discharged to grade through existing floor drains in the building. The solvents used are especially difficult to remove from the groundwater, and new methods for extracting or degrading the contaminant were recently tested at the site. This tour will highlight these technologies and explain the difficulties associated with the removal of this contaminant from the subsurface. MIDDENS, MOUNDS, CANALS AND CASTLES: A Look at KSC Before the Space Age by Joan Deming, Archaeological Consultants, Inc. The first people to occupy the KSC area arrived several thousands of years ago. Evidence of their occupation takes many forms, from light scatterings of artifacts found on the ground surface to burial mounds and shell middens marking the locations of the dead and the living. After the last aboriginal populations vanished from the area, early American settlers made their homes where the Indians once lived. Hidden in remote places not far from where man was launched into space, archaeologists have uncovered the sites of homesteads and commercial enterprises, as well as the remains of an old fort and canal. Ms. Deming's presentation will focus on the results of a multi-year archaeological survey of the KSC. Make sure your appliances and heating and cooling systems are properly maintained, and study your family's lighting needs and use patterns, paying special attention to high-use areas. Once you've determined where your home is losing energy, assign priorities to your energy needs; make smart purchases and home improvements that maximize energy efficiency and save the most money. NUTRITION TIP OF THE WEEK FROM THE KSC FITNESS CENTERS: Focus on food groups. Your body requires certain nutrients, such as protein, carbohydrates and fiber, to function properly. Since no single food provides all of the nutrients that your body needs, eating a wide variety of foods ensures that you get the necessary nutrients and other substances that promote good health. In general, food pyramids present these types of food:

- **Fruits:** From apricots to oranges, fruits are great sources of vitamins and minerals and soluble fiber. They're low in fat and calories.
- **Vegetables:** Like fruits, vegetables are great sources of vitamins, minerals and fiber.
- **Grains:** Breads, pasta, rice, noodles, couscous, polenta, bulgur and other grains are your main sources of carbohydrates. Most are low in fat.
- **Dairy products:** Milk, cheese, eggs, yogurt and other dairy products are good sources of calcium, protein and other vitamins and minerals. However, these foods can be high in cholesterol, fat and calories so consider choosing low-fat versions.
- **Meat and beans:** Meat, poultry and fish provide protein and are good sources of B vitamins, iron and zinc. Legumes - such as soybeans, black beans, split peas and lentils - are good substitutes for meat because they provide protein and also have added fiber.
- **Fats and oils:** These types of foods are high in fat and calories, so use sparingly.

INSPECTOR GENERAL: The Office of Criminal Investigations (OCI) is the investigative arm of the NASA Inspector General (IG). The OCI is an independent entity and reports directly to Robert Cobb, the NASA IG, in Washington D.C. The primary mission of this component is to conduct criminal and civil investigations of reported or suspected fraudulent acts by employees, contractors, and others relating to the administration of NASA contracts and programs. Although emphasis is placed on major procurement fraud, (particularly allegations of defective/substandard parts, mischarging, kickbacks, bid rigging, and research fraud), investigations are also conducted of theft, conflict of interest, environmental and hazardous waste violations, health care fraud, and computer related crimes. OCI also provides fraud briefings for Government and contractor employees that are designed to highlight potential risks concerning fraud and related matters. Suspected violations can be reported by calling 867-4714 locally, the toll free Hotline at 1-800-424-9183, or by writing NASA Inspector General, P. O. MAILING PRIVATE INFORMATION: When mailing documents containing Social Security Numbers or other private information, through the KSC Interoffice Mail system, KSC Form 13-242, A, B, or C, "**Open by Addressee Only**" envelopes must be used. (TA-E1)

USE OF MULTICOLOR OFFSET PRINTING, COLOR COPIERS, AND COLOR PRINTERS: Managers and employees are reminded that all color printing/copying must be in accordance with NPG 1490.5A. The NPG states that offset printing in two or more colors is prohibited for work in which additional colors provide no demonstrable value, but are used primarily for decorative effect. The unnecessary use of color products costs the government additional money without additional benefit. The NASA Inspector General has reviewed various agency products and determined that color products have increased significantly. Managers at all centers are to ensure requests for multicolor printing and color copying are only made when the use of multiple colors adds demonstrable value, not just cosmetic appeal, to the product. UNAUTHORIZED COMMITMENTS AND RATIFICATIONS: An unauthorized commitment is an agreement between the Government and a contractor that is not binding; solely, because the Government representative who made it lacked the authority to enter into that **UNAUTHORIZED** agreement on behalf of the Government. Ratification is the act of approving an unauthorized commitment by an official who has the authority to do so. Unauthorized commitments are strongly discouraged and can indicate serious employee misconduct. Individuals making unauthorized commitments may be subject to disciplinary action, and the issue may be referred to the Office of the Inspector General. If you are unsure of your authority, before directing a contractor to take any action, call your project control office, or the Procurement Office at 867-7217, for assistance. (OP-AM)
