EPA'S ENERGY STAR PROGRAM: 'Change a Light, Change the World' this fall October 1, 2003. EPA's ENERGY STAR program is launching the 2003 Change a Light, Change the World campaign, which challenges Americans to switch to lighting products, specifically bulbs and fixtures, that save energy, money, and protect the environment. "We are committed to promoting energy efficiency, and the Change a Light, Change the World campaign is a great way to get Americans thinking about ways to conserve energy, save money and help the environment," said EPA Acting Administrator Marianne Horinko. "If each household in the U.S. switched the lighting in just one room to ENERGY STAR lighting, we'd save enough energy to light more than 34 million homes and prevent one trillion pounds of greenhouse gas emissions. By replacing the five most frequently used light fixtures at home or bulbs with models that have earned the ENERGY STAR, a household can save more than \$60 a year in energy costs while enjoying the latest in style, design, convenience and efficiency." EPA, working with the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), is launching the national campaign with an energy-efficient lighting takeover at the Thomas Edison Winter Home in Fort Myers, Florida. The home's outdoor lampposts and porch lights are being changed to bulbs and fixtures that have earned the ENERGY STAR. This change coincides with the upcoming 125th anniversary of Edison's own light bulb invention. ENERGY STAR is working with TV's renovation and design expert Steve Thomas to conduct this change-out. ENERGY STAR qualified lighting lasts six to ten times longer than traditional lighting, and operates on two-thirds less energy. In addition, lighting products that have earned the label generate about 70 percent less heat than incandescent lighting, which means that they are cool to the touch and help reduce energy costs associated with cooling the home. During October and November, EPA and DOE are partnering with hundreds of manufacturers, retailers, state governments, utilities, and regional energy efficiency organizations throughout the United States to make finding and buying energy-efficient light bulbs and fixtures easier. Local, regional, and national activities include lighting change-out events and special offers from participating retail, manufacturer, and regional utility partners to help consumers save on light bulbs and fixtures that have earned the ENERGY STAR. The ENERGY STAR label can now be found on more than 35 product categories for home and office. - One half of a whole wheat bagel topped with peanut butter or hummus
- One cup of low-fat yogurt with two tablespoons whole grain cereal
- Carrot and pepper strips with low-fat salad dressing
- Sunflower or pumpkin seeds
- Mixed nuts and dried fruit
- A fresh fruit yogurt smoothie

INSPECTOR GENERAL: The Office of Criminal Investigations (OCI) is the investigative arm of the NASA Inspector General (IG). The OCI is an independent entity and reports directly to Robert Cobb, the NASA IG, in Washington D.C. The primary mission of this component is to conduct criminal and civil investigations of reported or suspected fraudulent acts by employees, contractors, and others relating to the administration of NASA contracts and programs. Although emphasis is placed on major procurement fraud, (particularly allegations of defective/substandard parts, mischarging, kickbacks, bid rigging, and research fraud), investigations are also conducted of theft, conflict of interest, environmental and hazardous waste violations, health care fraud, and computer related crimes. OCI also provides fraud briefings for Government and contractor employees that are designed to highlight potential risks concerning fraud and related matters. Suspected violations can be reported by calling 867-4714 locally, the toll free Hotline at 1-800-424-9183, or by writing NASA Inspector General, P. O. LEAVE ADMINISTRATION: Properly managing the use of annual and sick leave is your responsibility. Except for emergencies, you are expected to request leave in advance and obtain your supervisor's approval. In cases of emergency absence, call in and notify your supervisor of the circumstances as soon as possible after the start of the workday, but no later than 4 hours after the beginning of the workday. Failure to properly request and obtain approval of leave may result in the absence being charged to "Absence Without Leave" and could also lead to disciplinary action. Those who are earning annual leave above maximum accumulations limits must plan use of annual leave to avoid loss of one or more days at the end of the year. (BA-B).

KSC LIBRARY ARCHIVES: KMI 2240.1 establishes the KSC Library Archives. Supervisors are responsible to make files available to the KSC Library Archivist and to notify the Library Archivist prior to retiring or destroying documents or other materials which may be of enduring historical value. Of particular historical importance may be photographs, audio recordings, minutes of meetings, letters, memorandums for record, policy letters, directives, studies, special reports, maps, biographies, organization charts, and statistical tables. EMPLOYEE ORGANIZATIONS: Employees have the right to join, or refrain from joining, employee unions. NASA recognizes the right of its employees to form, join, and assist any employee organization, or to refrain from any such activity, and to exercise these rights freely and without penalty or reprisal. This right also extends to participation in the management of the employee organization and to acting as an employee organizational representative, except where such activity would result in a conflict of interest with the official duties of an employee. (BA-B)

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES HEALTH BENEFITS EXTENSION OF COVERAGE: The Federal Employees Health Benefits Amendments Act (PL 100-654) has provided separated employees, certain dependent children, and former spouses the option of keeping their Federal Employees Health Benefits (FEHB) plan for specific periods of time. Under the provisions, employees who leave the Government, either voluntarily or involuntarily, are eligible to continue FEHB coverage for 18 months if (1) the employee was enrolled in the FEHB at time of separation; and, (2) the employee was NOT fired because of "gross misconduct." This includes employees who retire and are not eligible to continue FEHB coverage as annuitants. Children who become age 22 and ex-spouses may continue coverage for up to 36 months provided they had coverage under a Federal employee at the time of the event. These individuals have continuation of coverage for 31 days at no cost to them. However, within 60 days of the event, they must submit paperwork to continue their FEHB.
